What did he make? Cornell was a visual artist and filmmaker


**About:** Joseph Cornell was an American artist who is most famous for creating fascinating works of

most tamous for creating fascinating works of art in boxes. Cornell used everyday objects and imagery that he found in and around his house to create his interesting displays.

He called these his shadow boxes.



Cornell loved collecting! metal springs, maps, marbles and corks...he would collect anything that caught his eye.





### 360. WHAT IS THE IDEA/INSPIRATION?

Let's make our very own mini-box artwork, inspired by the works of Joseph Cornell

#### **ACTIVITY OUTLINE**

Inspired by Joseph Cornell and the art he created living on his own in his home, we are going to make our very own artwork in a box. Our boxes are going to be small (like a long matchbox) and include objects, images, bits and bobs! Your box will be unique and you can exhibit in our 360° art gallery.

### HOW TO

# THINGS YOU WILL NEED

- A small box (long matchbox is perfect) but you could also use a stock cube box, a gift box or small cardboard lid (no bigger than 2.5cm thick).
- scissors, glue (PVA, glue stick or similar)
- old magazines, maps, books, birthday cards, photographs, newspapers (that you don't mind cutting up!)
- found objects like small stones, shells, dried flowers, springs, puzzle pieces - little things you have lying around at home or find in the garden that you want to include in your box





### INSTRUCTIONS

#### STEP 1.



#### **CHOOSE A BOX**

Depending on the box you use, you may need to cut a window on one side to see inside the box. Remember that if you want to send your artwork to us to use in the art gallery, choose a box that fits in a large envelope and can be posted!


#### STEP 2.



#### PICK A BACKGROUND

Cover the inside of your box to create a background for your objects and images. You could use some old newspaper, wrapping paper, coloured paper or maybe an old map. Cut your chosen paper in small pieces and glue onto your box until it's covered don't forget the back and sides too!

FIND YOUR MAIN IMAGE

# CHOOSE OBJECTS AND TELL YOUR STORY

Using objects and images that you have gathered from around your home or garden plan how you might display them in your box.

#### You will need:

- A main image/object
- 2 small objects
- Extra things to decorate with

Start with a main image, this could be a photograph of a pet, a character from a book, a flower - anything that takes your fancy!
Whatever you choose this will be the main thing in your box.

Then decide on the objects that you want to include in your box. Consider what looks good with your main object.

#### STEP 4.



#### SET UP YOUR DISPLAY

Try using only 3 or 4 objects – so not to overcrowd your box too much. Think about where you want your objects to go and if they look good together. You can stick them in with glue or hang things from the top using some string.

#### STEP 5.




#### FINAL TOUCHES

Make sure all objects are fixed and secure inside your box. If your box came with a lid, you could get an adult to help you cut a window in the lid to create a frame, but this is optional!

# BLACKOUT POEMS

Blackout Poetry is a form of 'found poetry' where you select words that catch your interest from a newspaper, book, or other printed text. Cornell would have LOVED blackout poetry because he loved looking for things!

- Use the template provided, or find a newspaper or book page that you don't need anymore.
- 2. Read each sentence and look for about 6-8 words that you really like. Carefully circle around these words with a dark pen.
- 3. When you have circled your words, check you are happy with them. Read them out loud does it sound like a good collection of words? Do you need some more words to make better sentences? Find and circle more words until you have a good sounding poem.
- 4. Now colour-in the rest of the words that you haven't used. Your blackout poem may look a little like this!

# CORNELL'S SCAVENGER HUNT

Joseph Cornell was always hunting for things to find and collect around his house. Let's see what you can find in yours! Can you find....

 $5 \times$ objects that you use everyday

5 x things in your garden or outside on a walk that remind you of summer

Your favourite food or drink

An animal (real or not so real!)

1 x piece of paper

1 x pencil or pen

Once you find your items, fold the paper into 4 squares. Now open the paper you have four Cornell drawing boxes! In each box, draw 4 of your chosen items.

# TREASURED PATTERNS

- Look around your house and garden to find a surface with any interesting textures. Perhaps a brick, a leaf, bumpy letters on a book or even your front door.
- Place a sheet of paper over the surface or pattern and use your crayon to gently rub over the paper. Watch the pattern magically appear on your paper.

TOP TIP: This pattern could be used for a background to your box!

# WHAT IS ARTS AWARD DISCOVER?

Arts Award Discover is an introduction to Arts Award, a set of awards for children and young people that gets them involved in and excited about the arts and culture and celebrates their artistic achievements. Arts Award aims to improve confidence and communication skills, as well as developing arts skills and knowledge.

To gain their Arts Award, young people create an arts log by collecting evidence of what they have done and reflecting on their experiences. This can be created in any form, from a scrapbook to a set of online files.

When they have finished Arts Award Discover children get a certificate from the international awarding organisation.



As children complete the practical art activities in these toolkits, they will need torecord what they have done, showing that they have competed all three parts of Discover which are:

PART A: Taking part in arts activity PART B: Finding out about an artist

PART C: Share your artwork

It can be evidenced in any format you like, from photos to writing to drawing. If you prefer, you can use the free, downloadable Art Builders Logbook to record all three parts. It is available from www.artbuilders.co.uk/resources

Once your child has completed all three parts of Discover at Home, for a small fee (£4 at time of writing) you can submit their work to Art Builders HQ (Animate Arts Company) who will arrange their certificate.

Schools who would like their Art Builders pupils to work towards an Arts Award Discover can also do so. Certificates can also arranged through Art Builders HQ (Animate Arts Company). Please get in touch to discuss.
