Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Developing Write a suitable clause to follow a place specific fronted adverbial in a singleclause sentence.

Expected Write a suitable second clause to follow a place specific fronted adverbial in a multi-clause sentence with a coordinating conjunction.

Greater Depth Write a suitable main and subordinating clause to follow a place specific fronted adverbial in a multi-clause sentence with a subordinating conjunction.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Move an identified place specific adverbial to the beginning of a sentence. Sentences have a single-clause.

Expected Move an unidentified place specific adverbial to the beginning of a sentence. Sentences are multi-clause sentences with coordinating conjunctions.

Greater Depth Move an unidentified place specific adverbial to the beginning of a sentence. Sentences are multi-clause sentences with subordinating conjunctions.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain whether a place specific fronted adverbial has been used correctly in a single-clause sentence.

Expected Explain whether a place specific fronted adverbial has been used correctly in a multi-clause sentence with a coordinating conjunction.

Greater Depth Explain whether a place specific fronted adverbial has been used correctly in a multi-clause sentence with a subordinating conjunction.

#### **Developing**

1a. Various answers, for example: In my bedroom, I have a computer.

2a. In the park, the children were making a den.

#### **Expected**

**4a.** Various answers, for example: Down by the river, I had a picnic and sunbathed.

#### **Greater Depth**

7a. Various answers, for example: At the end of the street, there is a playing field where I like to play football.

#### **Expected**

4b. Various answers, for example: At the top of the mountain, it was extremely cold, but the view was amazing.

5b. In the branches of the beech tree, the birds had constructed their nest, so that they could lay their eggs.

6b. No, because the rest of the sentence does not make sense with the place adverbial.

A more sensible sentence would be: Back at our house, we made a cup of tea, and sat by the fire to warm up.

#### **Greater Depth**

7b. Various answers, for example: All around the school, the children were on their best behaviour because they were having special visitors.

8b. At the entrance of the cinema, crowds of people were queuing to get in even though there were no seats left.

9b. No, because the rest of the sentence does not make sense with the place adverbial.

A more sensible sentence would be: In the playground, the teacher blew the whistle because it was time to go back into school.
