Expected

- **4a.** Various answers, for example: Courageously, the little boy fed the lion and took lots of photographs.
- 5a. Nervously, the children entered the abandoned house and explored the haunted rooms.
- 6a. No, she has not used it correctly because 'slowly' does not make sense in this context. Better examples of adverbials to use in this sentence are 'as quick as a flash' or 'speedily'.

Greater Depth

- 7a. Various answers, for example: Uncharacteristically, the head teacher, who was usually quite mean, handed out lots of stickers while the children were in assembly.
- 8a. Impressively, the enormous waves crashed on the white, sandy shore while the children paddled in the water.
- 9a. No, he has not used it correctly because 'without a sound' does not make sense in this context. Better examples of adverbials to use in this sentence are 'unexpectedly' or 'with an almighty crack'.

- 3b. No, he has not used it correctly because 'repeatedly' does not make sense in this context. Better examples of adverbials to use in this sentence are 'gradually' or 'thankfully'.

Expected

- 4b. Various answers, for example: Mysteriously, the hamster's bedding had vanished during the night.
- 5b. Secretly, the tooth fairy visited the children and left them a coin and a letter.
- 6b. No, she has not used it correctly because 'striped' is an adjective. Better examples of adverbials to use in this sentence are 'unfortunately' or 'annoyingly'.

 arena, although she had not been feeling
 well all day.

- 9b. No, he has not used it correctly because 'behind the stairs' is not a descriptive adverbial, it is an adverbial of place. Better examples of adverbials to use in this sentence are 'thankfully' or 'luckily'.
