



### Out of Character

### Location, location, location

#### Using the senses...

- · What can you hear?
- What can you feel? Example: the weather, how you feel by being there or something you touch.
  - What can you taste? · What can you smell?
    - ·What can you see?

This helps the reader to imagine they are there.




