

PE and Sport Premium Report Summary 2025

The PE and Sport Premium is additional funding provided to schools to improve the quality of physical education, increase participation in physical activity, and raise attainment in PE and school sport. During the academic year, the school received a total of £18670 in PE and Sport Premium funding, all of which was fully allocated to support high-quality provision and sustainable improvement.

A total of £3,775 was spent on professional development (CPD) through external training courses. This investment focused on improving staff confidence, knowledge, and competence in delivering high-quality PE and school sport. Training supported inclusive practice, ensuring staff were better equipped to meet the needs of all pupils, including those with SEND and long-term medical conditions. CPD also targeted strategies to increase girls' participation in PE and sport and to address inequalities faced by disadvantaged pupils. As a result, teaching quality in PE has improved, and staff feel more confident in planning and delivering engaging, inclusive lessons.

The remaining £6,975 of the funding was allocated to internal school-based physical activity provision. This included £5,800 spent on enhancing extra-curricular opportunities, allowing the school to broaden the range of physical activities available to pupils and increase participation in clubs and competitive sport. These opportunities have contributed to higher levels of physical activity across the school and greater engagement from pupils of all abilities. An additional £1,000 was spent on swimming provision, including top-up swimming lessons and broader aquatic opportunities, particularly to support pupils requiring additional assistance. A further £175 was invested in educational platforms and PE resources to support high-quality planning, delivery, and assessment of PE lessons.

Targeted spending ensured that pupils with SEND or long-term medical conditions were able to fully access PE and sport. Funding supported staff training in inclusive PE practice, specialist resources and equipment, top-up swimming lessons, and increased access to extra-curricular opportunities and competitions. This approach has helped remove barriers to participation and ensured equality of opportunity for all pupils.

The school also targeted funding to improve girls' access to PE and sport. Staff training focused on inclusive practice and encouraging positive attitudes towards physical activity, alongside increased opportunities to participate in extra-curricular clubs, competitions, and youth leadership roles. This has led to improved engagement, confidence, and participation among girls across the school.

Disadvantaged pupils were supported through a combination of stronger parental engagement and staff training designed to address inequalities in sport and physical activity. This targeted approach has helped increase participation levels and ensure that all pupils can benefit from the school's PE and sport provision.

The impact of the PE and Sport Premium has been positive across the school. Staff confidence and competence in teaching PE and school sport have increased, leading to higher-quality lessons and improved pupil outcomes. There has been an increase in pupils' physical activity levels, greater participation in extra-curricular activities, and increased involvement in competitive sport. The profile of PE and sport has been raised across the school, supporting whole-school improvement and reinforcing the importance of physical wellbeing.

Swimming and water safety outcomes for the current Year 6 cohort demonstrate a positive impact from the funding. 65% of pupils can swim competently, confidently, and proficiently over a distance

of 25 metres, while the same percentage (65%) can use a range of strokes effectively, including front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke. 45% of pupils are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations. Targeted swimming provision and top-up lessons have supported improvements in confidence, competence, and safety in the water.

The school has ensured that improvements made through the PE and Sport Premium are sustainable. Investment in staff training has built internal capacity, reducing reliance on external providers and embedding good practice across the school. The use of educational platforms and resources supports consistent, high-quality delivery of PE, while the established extra-curricular programme provides ongoing opportunities for pupils to remain active and engaged. These measures ensure that the positive impact of the PE and Sport Premium will continue beyond the current funding period.
