Key Vocabulary	
<b>Genesis</b> 	Genesis is the very first book in the Bible and the Torah. It tells the Christian and Jewish story of how God made the world. Genesis means 'beginning' – it's all about how everything started.
<b>Unique</b> 	Unique means there is no one or nothing else exactly like you. You are special and different in your own way, just like everyone has their own smile, voice, and talents.
<b>Represent</b> 	Represent means to show or stand for something else. When someone represents their school, they stand for their whole team or group.
<b>Responsibility</b> 	Responsibility means something you need to do or take care of.
<b>The Golden Rule</b> 	The Golden Rule is to treat other people the way you want them to treat you. For example, if you want others to be kind, helpful, and fair to you – you should be kind, helpful, and fair to them too.

Key Knowledge
Each person is unique and important. Christians and Jews believe that God values everyone. Non-religious people use 'The Golden Rule' to help them think about this.
Being a good friend has both benefits and responsibilities. We have skills we can use to help and care for other people.
The story in Genesis 1 reminds many Jewish and Christian believers that God is great, creative and concerned about creation and the people in it.
Many Jews and Christians are inspired by the story in Genesis 1 to be God's representatives and to care for the world.
Religious and non-religious people look after the world in lots of different ways.
