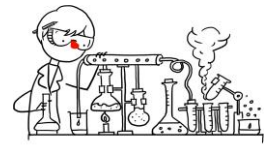



Key Vocabulary	
Humanism humanist 	A Humanist is a person who follows Humanist ideas: they don't believe in God or gods, and they try to make the world better by being kind, fair, and thoughtful.
Happy Happy Human 	The 'Happy Human' is the special symbol of Humanism. It looks like a person with their arms stretched up, as if they are happy and celebrating.
Special 	Special means something or someone is important and unique. It's what makes you 'you' – your ideas, your feelings, and the things you can do that no one else does in exactly the same way.
Reason 	Reason means using your brain to think carefully and make good choices. Humanists use reason to help them understand things and decide what is right or fair.
Empathy 	Empathy means trying to imagine how someone else is feeling. It's like putting yourself in their shoes so you can be kind and help them.

Key Knowledge
Humanism is not a religion but a way of thinking about how to live a good and happy life.
Humanist people have a non-religious worldview.
Humanists do not believe in God or gods and think this life is our only life.
Humanists believe people can find happiness in different ways and should try to live well and help others.
Humanists think we should be kind, use empathy, and follow the Golden Rule: treat others as you want to be treated.
Humanists try to make good choices by thinking about the consequences and by caring for other people, animals, and the natural world.
